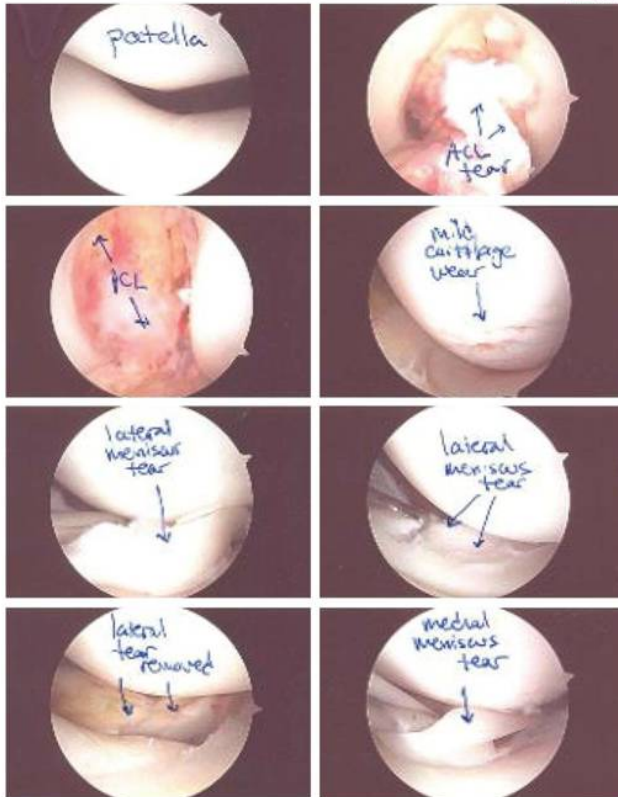

Injuries were a part of life for many athletes. On September 8, James Townsend, 11, saw her volleyball career flash before her eyes. "After jumping and attacking the ball, I landed incorrectly on my left knee. It all happened so fast!" recalled James.

Realizing that your season was over took an emotional toll on many athletes. James explained, "Volleyball was my life and when I was told my high school and travel seasons were over with, I was devastated."

The road to recovery often felt like it would never end. For James, the recovery process took longer due to muscle atrophy in her quadriceps. "I was on crutches, icing, and did not have use of my leg for the first three weeks," James admitted. "It had been four months and I was still doing hard core physical therapy."

It took months to get back to where she was before the injury. James said, "I could finally begin light volleyball training and reach my ultimate goal of playing volleyball again!"

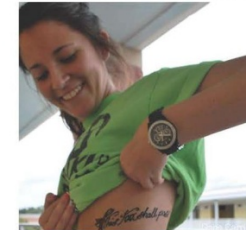

3. Connections With music comes dance. Briana Sanchez [12] would always connect music with her love of dance. Sanchez said, "Music and dance would always mean a lot to me."

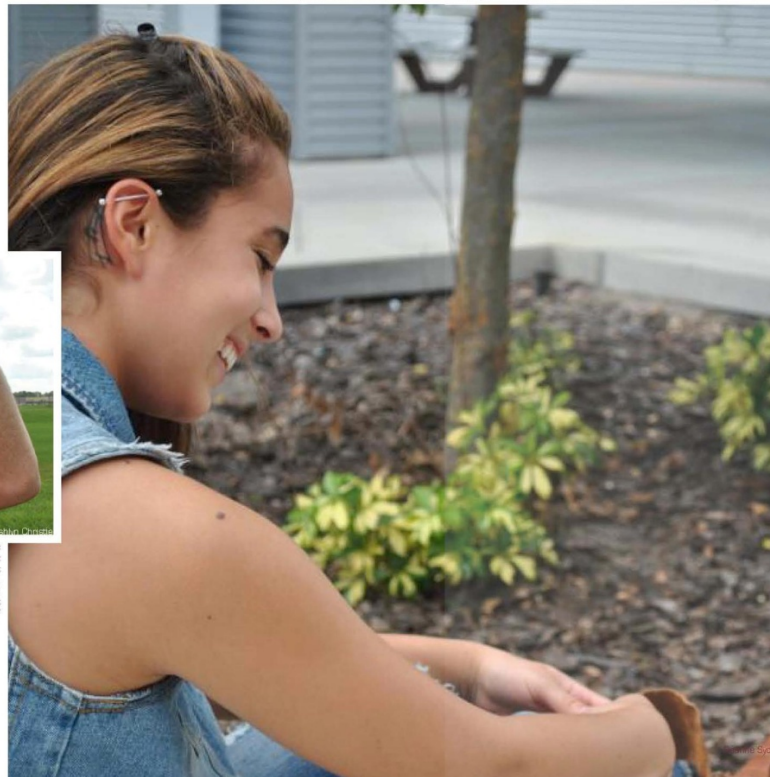
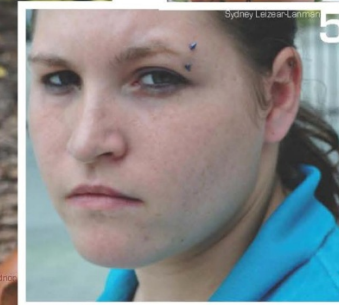


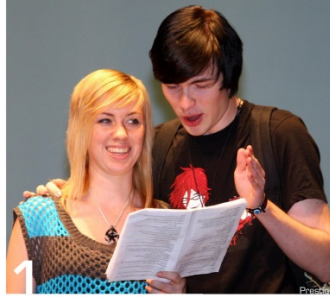
